Welcome to Honors English III. In the coming year we will focus on both rhetorical and literary analysis in the classroom. First, please purchase a clean, physical copy of Ender's Game by Orson Scott Card (ISBN: 978-0765378484).

While reading *Ender's Game* by Orson Scott Card, you are required to fill out the attached guided annotation chart. **You will type and submit a digital copy of this chart to Turnitin on the first day of school**. I will **NOT** accept a physical copy.

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Think of annotating in terms of having a conversation with the author in real time. It improves your understanding, increases what you remember, and prepares you to participate in classroom discussion. **The guided annotation chart will be worth 80 points in your homework/classwork category**.

In addition to annotating the text, you will have a timed writing over *Ender's Game* by Orson Scott Card within the first two weeks of school. We will discuss the exact date on the first day of school. **The timed writing will be worth 25 points in your writing category**.
